#### **Former President Clinton Spiritual Advisor to Keynote for Republican Challenger**

(Arlington, Virginia, December 29, 2015) Former bosses call him a miracle worker, but political opponents call him a man off his medication, but, whatever he is, it appears that the unlikely challenger in Virginia' 8<sup>th</sup> District has done it, again. This morning, he announced that the former spiritual advisor for President William Jefferson Clinton, Tony Campolo, will keynote at an Interfaith Prayer Breakfast (IPB) that his campaign will be hosting at the end of January. The location, at this announcement, is being determined.

Most Democrat experts claim that a victory for a Republican in the most Democrat district in the southern states is laughable, and what online commenter to a recent thread asked, “Why the 8<sup>th</sup> District?” Webb who likes to quote movies, but who also has an encyclopedic list of quotations from Latin phrases to passages from classical literature, immediately retorted, “Why go to the moon? We do it not because it is easy, but because it is hard.” That was John F. Kennedy's famous line from his address to students at Rice University.

But, when being wholly serious, a side few people see in public, Webb evidences that he has a very real grasp of the challenges in his electoral race. And, apparently, he must because, outspent 20 to 1 in 1991, Webb nearly ousted the Speaker of the New Jersey Assembly, and beat him in the town in which he also served as mayor. But, the outward evidence Webb's grasp is always subtle, but clear to the observant person. IPB, for instance, is not just the initials for his prayer breakfast. Perhaps, it is just a coincidence that military intelligence analysts, a field in which Webb was trained in the U.S. Army, use those same initials for Intelligence Preparation of the Battlefield.
