APS in Black

Black Parents of Arlington (BPA) believe parents, families and community members deserve a fast and easy way to understand how black children are faring in Arlington Public Schools.

BPA has compiled data on black and white student performance on standardized tests, their access to advanced level classes, college readiness and experience with school discipline.

Data Highlights!

- SOLs: 2017-18 showed widespread drops in SOL pass rates for black students. Some schools fared better than others and showed narrower racial disparities in SOL pass rates.
- Black student entry into the Gifted and Talented Program is stagnant and is outpaced by white student over enrollment.
- The vast majority of black students enrolled in AP/IB classes do not pass the year end exams to receive college credit.
- Most black students do not graduate with the Advanced High School Diploma, best suited for competitive colleges and universities.
- Disparities in disciplinary suspensions persist.




Data Sources

The data covers the three-year period, 2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18, and is sourced from APS Dashboard and VDOE published data. As a benchmark we've compared data reported on black students to the performance of white students to highlight racial disparities in APS.

SOL Scores


Overall, 2017-18 saw an overall drop in black student SOL pass rates. From 76% to 71% in math, and from 76% to 73% in reading. Still, each individual school fared differently. Check pass rates for your school and others on the flipside of this pamphlet.






Gifted and Talented (GTE) Identification

GTE identification of black students continues to lag well behind white students.




Advanced Course Access and Pass Rates

2017-18 saw a small uptick in black student enrollment in AP/IB classes, from 61% to 63%. This is well behind their white counterparts at 91% and 89% respectively. However, most alarming is that black students overwhelmingly don't achieve passing marks on AP/IB exams. In 2017-18, only 31% passed at least one of these exams, compared to 79% for white students.



College Readiness

On-time graduation rates are a highpoint in the data, 94%, 92% and 94% over the past three years for black students. However, this masks a deeper issue. The majority of these black graduates do not earn an advanced diploma, useful for entry into competitive colleges and universities. Only 44%, 43%, 46% of black students earned it in the three reporting years. Compared to 82%, 84% and 82% of white graduates.
